
The Rural Development Programme for England (RDPE) is one of the government's main programmes of grants and support for rural businesses, community groups and the environment, with a budget of over £1bn for new applications.

It is made up of five main schemes, which we expect to remain available until 2019-2020.

The Countryside Productivity large capital grant is now open, which can fund up to 40% of a wide range of farm and business investments. The small grant scheme (up to £12,000) has opened with an easy, on-line application process. Also, now is a good time to start planning Countryside Stewardship Scheme applications.

Our local teams have considerable experience of working with businesses to develop ideas and successfully make applications to the RDPE. So please call them – even if it is just an acorn of an idea...

COUNTRYSIDE PRODUCTIVITY SCHEME

Status	Purpose	Organising body
Small grant scheme: Open, 14 th March 2018 on-line application deadline. Large capital grants: Open until June - December 2018 European Innovation Partnership: Closed	Grants to increase the productivity of businesses, mainly farms. Grants are available for animal productivity, health and welfare, remote crop sensing, forestry processing, slurry management, recycling emissions, crop robotics, atmospheric storage, water management including irrigation and reservoirs. It offers grants for buying equipment or machinery, up to 40% of eligible costs, for both small and large grants: 1. Small grants: £3,00 - £12,000 2. Large grants: £35,000 - £1m The application process can be lengthy, complicated and requires evidence of consents required, such as planning permission, and multiple quotes for buying machinery. The European Innovation Partnership for Agricultural Productivity and Sustainability (EIP-Agri) provides support to projects which show innovation in linking research with farming or forestry practices to improve productivity and sustainability. 
Status	Purpose	Organising body
All priorities: Open for expressions of interest until 31st May 2018. Recommended to apply ASAP. Projects should be finished and paid for, and grant claims submitted by 31st December 2020.	Grants for projects which create jobs and economic growth in rural areas. The three priorities are about growing businesses and diversification in: 1. business development 2. food processing (meat, milk, fruit processing) 3. tourism infrastructure (new infrastructure, extensions to buildings) Eligible costs are buying new or improving buildings, equipment and machinery. Minimum grant £35,000, maximum £170,000 - £1m, covering up to 40% of eligible costs¹. Applications should ideally show that they are creating one full-time job per £30,000 of grant. Most of the grants are available to farmers and other rural businesses. The application process has been simplified. It is a two stage process: Stage 1: Expression of interest, which is now less lengthy and with a quicker response from the RPA (30 days). Stage 2: Application in full (this is quite lengthy). This grant can get confusing as calls for applications for different types of project happen in different areas at different times and different amounts of grants are available. The RPA will publish calls for applications. These calls invite applications for grants in specific LEP areas. This link takes you to a page on the Gov.uk website where you can select your region and grants that are open for applications (select fund state open). The government has confirmed that it will honour existing grants after the UK leaves the EU, subject to some conditions (value-for-money and fit with current policy). Budget: £177m; this includes the £120m announced in January 2017. New CS Offers for Wildlife: Open but application packs to be requested by 31 May with submission deadline on 31 July 2018. The Arable Offer will be available online from 20 February 2018. Mid-tier: Open but application packs to be requested by 31 May 2018 with submission deadline on 31 July 2018	 England's main agri-environment scheme. There are four main elements: New CS Offers for Wildlife Arable Offer – applicants choose a minimum of 3 options from a total of 11. Lowland Grazing Offer – applicants choose a minimum of 2 options from a total of 7. The Mixed Farming Offer – applicants choose a minimum of 3 options from a total of 14. Higher tier: Open but application packs to be requested by 31 May 2018 with submission deadline on 31 July 2018	Mid Tier – for supporting farm wildlife and wild pollinators, improving water quality and reducing water pollution (linked to CSF), and reducing flood risk.	
Capital grants (for hedgerows and boundaries): Open for applications with a deadline of 30 April 2018 Capital grants (for woodland management plans): Always open Woodland creation: Open but deadline for applications is 16	Higher Tier – for priority habitats, woodland planting and management, and educational access. Capital grants – for hedgerows and boundaries, woodland management plans, woodland creation and tree health. The New CS Offers for Wildlife are not competitive assuming that the applicant meets the minimum criteria. There is a good success rate (70%+) for Mid Tier and Higher Tier applications that meet level priorities support wild.	
February 2018. Woodland management: Closed Tree health: Always open Facilitation fund floods round: Closed on 15 February	Tier applications that meet local priorities, support wild pollinators, improve water quality or reduce flood risk. There is also a grant available, called the facilitation fund, for land managers to work together across a landscape or catchment. This pays for a 'facilitator' to work with your chosen group of farmers and land managers – developing a collaboration spirit.	
Facilitation fund for wildlife: Closed	Budget: £925m, plus £2.2bn of existing commitments.
